School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2020-2021)

Petaluma Junior High School (PJHS) is one of seven secondary schools in the Petaluma City School District and one of two comprehensive junior high schools that serves students in grades 7 and 8. Petaluma Junior High School serves 14 small elementary schools representing 10 different school districts. PJHS prepares students for entry to Petaluma High School, which is located a half mile away. PJHS has a School Site Council (SSC), a Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA), and English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC).

All students take a core program of six academic classes including physical education and one period of elective. Based on assessments, students may enroll in accelerated/advanced classes in English and/or Math in seventh grade, and continue on to similarly advanced levels in eighth grade, including Integrated Math 1. Students must achieve a minimum of 110 credits (of a potential 120) over the course of two years to be eligible for participation in the promotion exercise at the end of their eighth grade year.

Here are some ways for involvement:

- The PTSA holds monthly meetings and works to support the students and the school with events and
 fundraisers. Parents are given the opportunity to complete a survey of what they would like to be involved in
 at the beginning of the year. Parents of the Leadership students are also very involved. PTSA Board members
 along with the school's administration and Leadership staff, work with those involved to coordinate events.
- Site Council also hold monthly meetings. The School Site Council is comprised of parents, teachers, and staff. The main discussions center around the SPSA and how to support students.
- ELAC (English Learner Advisory Committee) meetings are held 3-4 times a year. These meetings are an
 opportunities to educate EL parents about school programming, high school and higher education
 programming, and parenting and language classes that are offered in the district. Two of the ELAC parents also
 are chosen to sit on the District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC).

- Numerous opportunities are advertised and many parents volunteer their time in direct class support and auxiliary capacities like working in our garden, working in the staff workroom, participating in reading circles, chaperoning field trips, etc. when students are on campus.
- PJHS's Back to School Night and Open House are two big events that parents attend each year. Back to School
 Night is in the beginning of the year and allows teachers to meet parents, share about their classes, and
 reiterate their expectations. Open House is in the spring and showcases students' work over the course of the
 school year. Future seventh grade students and parents are also invited to attend. This year these events will
 be held virtually.
- Parents are also invited to participate in the district wide LCAP committee to help create and support the district's local control accountability plan and provide important feedback for students at the junior high level.

In collaboration with a district level safety grant, PJHS practices each quarter a fire, earthquake, lockdown, and active shooter drill involving the entire staff and student body. District and local emergency agencies are invited to attend each drill, monitor and provide feedback on the effectiveness of the drills.

Four professional development days have been built into the work year calendar. For the 2020-21 school year, the biggest need for professional development was providing support for teachers to move to Distance Learning. This included Zoom training, Google Classroom, FlipGrid, Ed Puzzle, etc. For the 2019-20 school year, district staff were surveyed to collect teacher professional development interest/need. The area of highest interest/need were selected as topics for the professional development days. The professional development days were divided into elementary and secondary topics, and the PD was delivered in a workshop model with a variety of sessions offered. Some of the workshop sessions offered included, math implementation, site-level collaboration, technology support, Maker/3-D printing, inquiry and project-based learning, effective influences on student learning, classroom management, accessing/discerning reliable information, and environmental literacy. All years, teachers also attend workshops, trainings, and conferences provided by the Sonoma County Office of Education, among other outside providers. To support implementation, several committees have been formed and meet regularly to plan for continued teacher support. The K-12 Curriculum/Staff Development committee met and planned the four professional development days. All teachers participated as members of Professional Learning Networks (PLNs) and met monthly to further their collaborative work. Teachers also are provided time on early-release Wednesdays district wide for teachers to participate in collaboration, professional development, and staff meetings.
